MEMORANDUM

To be accessioned as a gift of Dr. Charles Firestone, Albuquerque, N.M. (Care Dr. Polk Richards, Indian Service), two human brains, one Navaho, the other Laplander.

The Navaho brain has just been received and is in excellent condition. As stated in the correspondence, the Laplander brain was received about a year ago, but was poorly preserved and only with difficulty separated from the surrounding cotton packing. No decision was made at the time of receipt as to keeping this brain. Since it now seems to have become fairly well hardened in the formalin solution, and may still have some value, it might as well be accessioned. The reason for the delay in acknowledgment should be explained to Dr. Firestone.

The sections of lung accompanying the Navaho brain are of no value for our studies, since the cause of death is stated, and therefore will be destroyed.

My dear Doctor Firestone:

Referring to your recent telegram, addressed to Dr. Hrdlicka, it is with much pleasure that I formally acknowledge the receipt of the Nevaho Indian brain therein referred to. I take advantage of this opportunity also to advise you that the brain of a Laplander girl, which you forwarded from Seattle, and about which you especially inquire, was duly received. It was in poor condition, and no decision was made at the time as to the advisability of keeping the specimen. It has now become fairly hardened, however, and may still prove to be useful. This will account for our delay in acknowledging the receipt of the specimen.

Both of the specimens have now been recorded as a gift in your name and I would assure you that we greatly appreciate your continued interest in the national collections.
